#### Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

#### Statement of intent

Our Pupil Premium Strategy is designed to narrow the attainment gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils. Disadvantaged pupils, nationally, achieve less well than non-disadvantaged pupils.

The school identifies children for additional support and intervention. In addition, disadvantaged pupils benefit from well trained staff, which enables 'quality first teaching' as well as targeted intervention.

A significant proportion of our disadvantaged pupils are Post LAC. **Maintaining effective pastoral/emotional support is a priority to enable these children to achieve.** Our ethos and vision, supported by whole school restorative approaches and targeted pastoral support aims to address these barriers to learning. Our Pupil Premium Strategy Plan supports dedicated time for experienced and well-trained pastoral support staff.

Our effective broad and balanced curriculum is enhanced with rich experiences. Some of our pupils' parents are unable to provide the cultural and sporting experiences others take for granted. Teacher led extra-curricular cubs etc. are offered free to all pupils but where there are extra curricular and curriculum opportunities that have a cost we will support parents with this cost and ensure equality of access to experiences which enrich the curriculum.

Standardised NFER scores are completed for all pupils termly during the academic year. The numbers of disadvantaged pupils are low, making statistical comparisons problematic. However, assessments show disadvantaged children make excellent progress from their individual starting points.

Disadvantaged pupils are discussed at termly pupil progress meetings. All interventions are evaluated and adjusted termly.
